This visibility reinforces belonging, strengthens connection to community, and supports resilience during a critical milestone.

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Graduation, Enlistment, and Readiness: The School Liaison (SL) Connection

Across our installations, SLs continue to play a pivotal role in strengthening the educational journey of military-connected students, from their first day in a new school to the moment they cross the graduation stage. Their work is a quiet force multiplier, ensuring students have every opportunity to thrive academically, socially, and beyond high school. SLs collaborate daily with families, schools, community stakeholders and command teams to remove barriers that can disrupt academic progress.

SLs play a behind-the-scenes but essential role in ensuring military-connected seniors are celebrated, supported, and set up for success as they transition into adulthood.

Their support often includes:

- Coordinating participation in graduation ceremonies
- Ensuring recognition of military-connected students
- Helping schools understand PCS-related credit transfers so seniors stay on track
- Advocating for students who may need additional assistance to complete graduation requirements
- Supporting "Military Signing Day" recognition events
- Coordinating with recruiters to ensure students and families understand timelines and requirements
- Senior Transition and Post-Secondary Support



By ensuring military-connected students experience stability, continuity, and strong support through graduation and post-secondary transitions, SLs reduce stress on families, strengthen community resilience, and help service members stay focused on the mission.

Their ability to bridge communities, schools, families, and command teams ensures that every senior, whether college-bound, career-ready, or entering military service has a clear, supported path forward. This investment directly reinforces force readiness today and builds the foundation for the next generation of leaders who will carry our mission into the future.



Data Readiness: Strengthening Decisions at Every Level

SLs deliver decision-quality data that enables commanders to see, understand, and act on the education conditions impacting mission readiness. Through disciplined tracking of engagements, inquiries, and cases, SLs provide a real-time picture of how effectively school systems are supporting military-connected students, then translating that data into operationally relevant insights.



At the installation level, this may include measurable indicators such as enrollment data, PreK-12 funding, graduation pathway risks, and access to critical services like special education. This localized data is strengthened by state-level education insights, providing commanders with a broader context. Metrics such as graduation rates, assessment outcomes, and access to advanced coursework including AP, dual enrollment, and Career Technical Education help determine the overall quality and capacity of surrounding school systems. Through Status of Education (SOE) reporting, these data points are elevated to identify trends across installations, regions, and services. The operational impact is direct. Data-driven visibility enables commanders to engage school systems with precision, advocate effectively for military students, and address emerging issues before they escalate. Education stability is not incidental, it is measurable, actionable, and essential to sustaining family confidence, supporting retention, and maintaining mission focus.

The Pulse of Our Schools: Tracking Key Data



The following examples reflect the types of education data SLs may provide to commanders; however, availability varies by state and local education systems. When accessible, this data enables SLs to elevate student-level issues.

LOCAL DATA:

- Special education timelines and service availability
- Policy execution (consistent application of Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (MIC3) protections)
- Trend data (repeat issues, high-impact districts, volume over time)
- School environment, safety and resources
- Educator recruitment and retention

STATE DATA:

- Graduation rates and academic performance indicators
- Policy environment: open enrollment, Purple Star, advance enrollment
- Implementation of MIC3
- PreK availability and early education access
- Military Student Identifier (MSI) disaggregated data (where available)

ENTERPRISE & NATIONAL DATA:

- National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) trends
- Graduation rate comparisons (state and national benchmarks)
- Impact Aid metrics
- Nationally recognized achievement scores (SAT, ACT, AP)
- Defense State Liaison Office state policy priorities

Education stability is not a quality-of-life issue; it is a readiness requirement.

Educator Engagement That Elevates Military Student Success

Supporting military-connected students requires strong, intentional partnerships between installations, state and local education agencies. SLs play a pivotal role in building these relationships, ensuring that schools have the information, access, and support needed to understand the unique experiences of military families. **Key SL functions include:**

- **Strengthen** educator partnerships through consistent communication
- **Facilitate** on-base learning by coordinating school visits and career exploration
- **Support** student transitions to reduce academic and social disruption
- **Advise** educators on the impacts of military life on students
- **Collaborate** with state and local agencies on policies and programs that improve continuity
- **Promote** awareness of protections such as MIC3
- **Address** systemic barriers by identifying trends and developing solutions with schools and command teams
- **Provide** training and professional development
- **Enhance** community engagement through events, recognition, and partnerships

Local schools are regularly welcomed onto the installation for immersive, curriculum-enhancing tours that highlight a wide range of DAF missions. 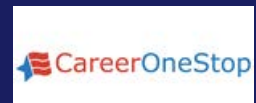
Sustained partnership with Enid Public Schools highlights the strategic value of SLPM engagement in

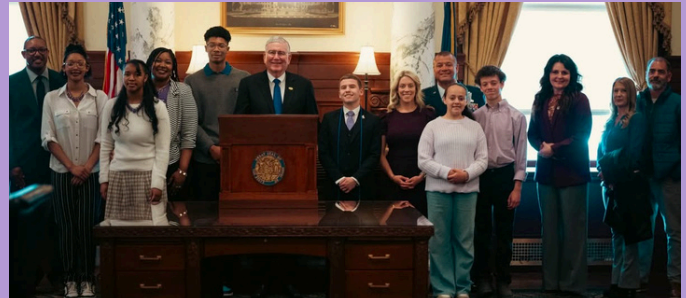

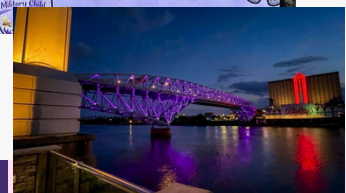

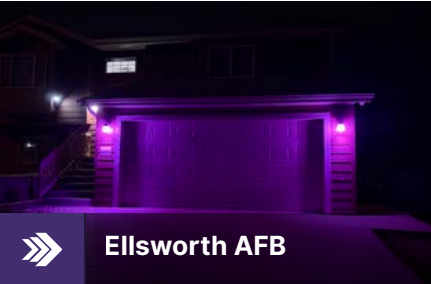


exploration, commemorating the contributions of our youngest heroes.



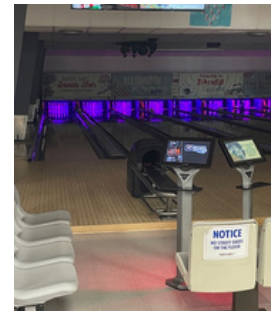
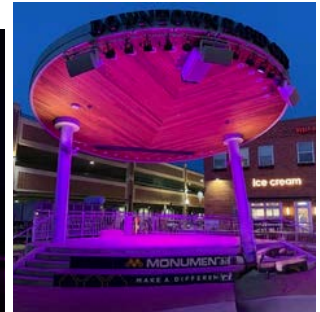
Sheppard AFB

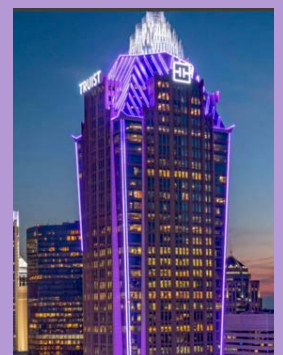
NATO AB Geilenkirchen

CHAPTER 400 Graduation

MIC3

Military moves should not hinder a student's journey toward graduation. The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (MIC3) facilitates collaboration among states to ensure that military-connected students remain on course in their education.

Key MIC3 Provisions

- **Waiver Requirements:** Receiving LEAs shall waive comparable completed coursework or provide an alternative means for timely completion.
- **Exit Exams:** States shall accept sending-state exit exams, national norm-referenced tests, or approved alternative assessments.
- **Senior-Year Transfers:** LEAs shall coordinate issuance of a sending-state diploma when a transferring senior cannot meet receiving-state requirements.

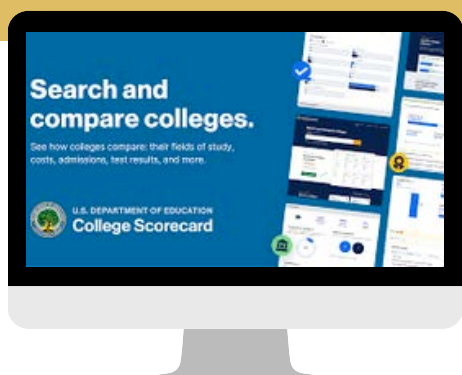
