No federal government endorsement intended – please research each agency independently. This list may not be all inclusive as new programs develop frequently.

Early Intervention: Research shows that the first three years of life are a crucial time of development. Children whose special needs are identified and addressed early have a greater chance of reaching their fullest potential. IDEA ensures that children identified with any special educational are entitled to a free and appropriate education. Early intervention programs could allow your child receives an Individual Education Plan (IEP) BEFORE they reach school age. This is crucial!

Youth Intervention: There are also services and assistance for school age children and event young adults with special needs and still in the school system. Intervention at **ALL stages** is needed to reach full potential!

ECC offers multiple programs focused on prevention and intervention for young children. Their goal is to ensure that all children with special needs are supported. Their fundamental belief is that "Every Child Counts" and their services work towards that belief. **Their programs include:** Community Developmental Screenings (0-5 yrs old), Help me Grow Hillsborough (0 – 8 yrs old), Infant Mental Health (0 – 3 yrs old), and Inclusion Support Services (various ages). **You can begin an online developmental screening here:** <u>https://ecctampabay.org/community-developmental-screening-program/</u>.

Early Steps is Florida's early intervention system that offers services to eligible infants and toddlers (birth to thirty-six months) with significant delays or a condition likely to result in a developmental delay. Early Intervention is provided to support families and caregivers in developing the competence and confidence to help their child learn and develop.

They provide specialized services to students (Pre-K - 12th grade) who present with serious, complex behavioral, social/ emotional, and/or cognitive conditions. ICEI is funded by the State of Florida through the Florida Dpt. of Education, Bureau of Exceptional Education and Student Services (BEESS) for the purpose of providing an array of diagnostic, evaluation, consultation, and professional development services to enhance the educational success of students enrolled in Florida schools.

ICEI accepts referrals for school aged students (Pre-K-12th grade) who have one or more of the following:

- Serious problem behaviors that have not responded to behavior interventions or strategies
- Behaviors/characteristics that indicate a need for an autism spectrum disorder evaluation
- Complex social/emotional/cognitive/developmental issues

They begin with a comprehensive assessment to determine which service(s) will best meet the needs and then they help navigate those services. They offer:

- Successful Families: bilingual, culturally competent, community-based services for children and families.
- Successful kids: coordinated mental health services
- Successful students: truancy intervention program
- Successful youth: for youth in the juvenile justice system
- Successful parents: pre and post-natal support
- Healthy Minds Program: for youth and young adults who have begun experiencing unusual thoughts/behaviors.
- Healthy Transitions: youth 16-25 struggling with mental health issues

The program is designed specifically for those parents who may not feel confident in their own abilities to teach their children. In the United States, HIPPY is a two or three year program for parents with children ages 2-5.
